Riverton Hall Renovations

The ERVCDA were a recipient of an almost \$100,000 Accessibility Grant to make the Riverton Hall fully accessible.

Over the last 2 years progress was made, in spite of a few hiccups. We now have 2 fully accessible washrooms located at the front of the building, new flooring, new ramp at the front of the building, a new automatic door, and wheelchair accessible tables.

We would like to thank Gordon Sutherland and Greg Johnson who looked after construction, Ben Gourd who did our electrical and Dennis Raniowski who helped with plumbing. All great East River Valley construction partners of ERVCDA.





A Look at Eureka of the Past

Over time some of our once thriving rural villages has disappeared from our map. Like Ferrona, beside Eureka. Gone is the village, the train station and the Presbyterian Church that used to stand out in that valley behind the Eureka fire hall. The settlement grew significantly beginning with the building of the Eureka Woolen Mill using equipment purchased in the USA and fine, silky wool imported from Australia and South Africa. A three-storey building

imported from Australia and South Africa. A three-storey building measuring 40x150 feet was built, a dam 130 feet wide and 19 feet high was built across the East River and a water wheel and stem engines powered the woolen mills. Steam from the boiler was used to heat each of the rooms in winter, an unheard of luxury in the 1880s. Sadly, 12 year old Henry David Munro was killed at the mill after getting tangled up in one of the long belts that ran the mills. Sadly, child labour was not uncommon in that era. By 1887 the Nova Scotia Electric Light Company was installing street lights in New Glasgow, Stellarton and Westvillle and within the next year telephones were being installed. By 1891 work began on an iron smelter. The 125 foot high smokestacks seemed massive! The fireproof roof for the boiler room came from Germany and I. Matheson Co. from New Glasgow began building furnaces and equipment. Again tragedy struck a year later when Peter Tobin was killed when he got caught in a pulley. By then the plant was making 70 – 80 tons of pig iron a day and there were 300 employees. The rail line had been expanded to Ferrona and Eureka and this now quiet valley was anything but quiet in the 1890s. Injuries and deaths were not uncommon in that era, before today's safety procedures became commonplace. And pollution. The waste water from the iron smelter polluted the East River so bad that the water by the time it reached New Glasgow was unfit for human consumption. Dozens of homes were built, along with stores and Zion Presbyterian churches in Ferrona and First Presbyterian in Hopewell.
