

Congratulations to the hard working vounteers that have made these and all the other community events possible.

Editor's Note: This article was submitted by Libby Fraser, lifelong member of St. Columba and Church Council Secretary, who discovered the July 17th break-in at St. Columba Church.

This article was originally to be one of celebration – of achievements and to some extent pride, instead it is a recording of our journey of life and as the chorus of one of my favourite hymns a prayer for our communities as we walk this road. Last fall after several years of planning and fundraising we were able to have repairs completed to the ceiling and upper walls of our sanctuary at St. Columba. We were so pleased and proud of this. After Easter we painted the lower portion of the church and in May held a service of celebration of this work. In June we held a guilt show in the sanctuary and the abundant colours and the meticulous handiwork blazed the sanctuary. We were graced with over 100 pieces of handiwork from friends near and far. As in any family or community illness and death has touched our community on several occasions over the last few months. We have celebrated the life of these people and have mourned their loss. Also, as in family we have celebrated the birth of children (or grandchildren), graduations, engagements and marriages. On the evening of Saturday, July 17<sup>th</sup> I went to the church to print the bulletins. As I opened the door I was sickened and horrified to find that the church had been BROKEN INTO AND TRASHED FROM TOP TO BOTTOM. Our 1863 pulpit Bible SHREDDED, our display cabinets SMASHED AND ARTIFACTS DESTROYED. OUR COMPUTER AND OTHER ITEMS STOLEN.

As we are all aware the items in our churches, for the most part, are not monetarily valuable but historically irreplaceable. As one of our church members commented- why would someone pick on a church, if they were they looking for money they obviously don't know that most churches are struggling financially so there's no money to be had. Our minister, Rev. Heather Landry reminded us that:

"While it is natural to be angry, hurt and disgusted, the beloved church that we are (beyond the building) is called, especially at times like these, to remember that there is obviously someone out there who needs our PRAYERFUL CONCERN - for it is unimaginable the frame of mind it must take to do such a thing."

Although all of us at St Columba are experiencing a varied range of emotions from anger and frustration, to sadness and a sense of violation we have been touched by the care and concern of the local communities. We have been receiving calls of support from friends near & far. Among the first of these to call was Rev. Landry's son Jon (the Stanfields), who, along with the support of their management team have offered to put a benefit together. Since the congregation is due to return to St. Columba on Sunday August 1, Rev. Landry thought that would be the perfect day to hold this wonderful celebration of community coming together in support of the church. It will be very helpful to the congregation to have a joyous return to the church and it also coincides with the Riverfront Jubilee which makes it very convenient for some of the musicians to join us. We are very appreciative of their support.

This incident also serves as a reminder to us that we need to be ever conscious of being good neighbours to each other. If we notice something that seems out of place we need to follow up on it. We need to take a glance when we pass by our churches or parks to see if anything appears amiss. When we work together as a community, hopefully it will be safer for us all.

### **Fruit Vinegar Recipes**

Warm Salad: stir fry thin strips of meat, chicken, fish with julienned vegetables. Add fruit vinegar, heat to a boil, pour mixture immediately over a bed of mixed greens.

Cherry or Raspberry Iced Tea; combine 4 cups of freshly brewed double strength tea, 1/3 cup fruit vinegar. Sweeten to taste and serve over ice.

Fresh Fruit Dressing: combine 1/2 cup light sour cream, 2 Tbsp. fruit vinegar and 2 Tbsp honey, stir until blended. Serve over fruit salad. Easy Mulled Cider: heat apple juice with 1 Tbsp fruit vinegar and 1 cinnamon stick per serving. Sweeten to taste.

Sauce Base: substitute fruit vinegar for wine to deglaze skillets after browning meats. It creates wonderful pan drippings for sauce or gravy bases.

With raspberries in season, make a refreshing iced tea or a dressing for fruits, vegetables and sautees with these easy to prepare flavoured vinegars.

**Raspberry Vinegar:** makes four 240mL jars. You'll need 4 cups of raspberries and 5 cups of white vinegar. Combine and bring to a boil in a large stainless steel or enamel pan, bring to a boil and boil gently for 15 mins. Pour mixture through a dampened cheesecloth lined sieve or strainer. Return the vinegar to the pan and bring back to a boil. Ladle vinegar into sterilized jars filling to within a 1/4 inch of the top rim, wipe rim clean and place snap lid on and screw band until finger tight. Process in a boiling water bath for 5 mins., remove jars and cool for 24 hours. Check that jars are sealed and place in a cool dark place for storage. Note: for Cherry Vinegar you'll need 8 cups of sweet cherries and 5 cups of vinegar.



No doubt the farmers out there are more than familiar with fly strike. With the hot humid weather we've been having lately, fly strike is almost inevitable and not only affects livestock but pets as well. Flies are attracted to a moist, smelly environment and lay their eggs which in turn hatch out as larvae - maggots. Not only are maggots disgusting and guite revolting (to most of us anyway) but they pose a real danger to your pet if not eradicated. They usually feed on decaying matter or flesh but when this is no longer available, they will migrate to live tissue, invading wounds or orifices such as the rectum or vulva, or invade deep into the ear canal, etc... When permitted to run unchecked, maggots will cause bacterial infection and have been known to kill animals. Some pets are more susceptible to fly strike; those spending a lot of time outside, those with vomiting, diarrhoea, matted or dense fur, those with scratches or sores, skin conditions, or those with weakened immune systems. If you notice your pet biting or scratching, shaking or rubbing an area, this could be an indication of fly strike. If untreated, loss of appetite, open sores with a foul odour and maggots will be seen. The best defence against fly strike is prevention. Keep your pets dry and clean. If it's an outside animal, inspect it periodically for any mats which can trap moisture and debris and provide an ideal environment for maggots. If your pet has very thick fur, maggots can be difficult to see although they do give off a very distinct odour that once smelt is very hard to forget! If your pet has any open sores, diarrhoea or vomiting, treat them promptly. If your animal does develop fly strike, prompt action is necessary. Once the fly lays its eggs, it takes 8 to 12 hours for the larvae to hatch and they immediately begin tunnelling under the skin causing irritation, fluid and protein loss, and eventually, bacterial infection. Treatment includes removing all maggots from the area; shaving fur/hair, cleaning the wounds and removing any dead tissue. If open sores or wounds are present, antibiotics may be necessary and depending on the severity of the pets condition, IV fluids and further wound treatment may be in order. In closing, it is much easier and less expensive to prevent the disease than to treat it, and no pet is immune from fly strike. Wishing you and your pets a happy, healthy, fly strike free summer! T.
